

Receiving Holy Communion: Some Practical Reminders

It is a real blessing that we have so many receive Our Lord in Holy Communion on a regular basis! Since it has been a while since I printed Communion-related reminders in the bulletin, I am taking this opportunity to remind everyone of some practical matters with regard to this Sacrament.

First: Only Orthodox Christians who are properly prepared are invited to receive Holy Communion. Additionally, I do not give blessings to non-communicants (whether Orthodox or non-Orthodox) during the distribution of Communion. (That is what we do after Liturgy, when everyone is invited to come forward for blessed bread, to kiss the Cross, etc.)

Come close! If the clergyman has to reach, then there is a greater chance that the Eucharist will be dropped. If you are too far back, you may be asked to step closer.

Open wide and tilt your head back. Within Orthodoxy, there are variations on the exact way the Eucharist is received by the communicant. In our Diocese, the general practice is to open your mouth and allow the priest or deacon to reverently place the Eucharist in your mouth, without closing your lips on the spoon. However, in order to do this effectively, you need to open wide (like when you're at the dentist), tilt your head back, and not stick out your tongue. If you do not open your mouth widely, or if you tilt your head forward instead of backwards, there is a greater possibility of an accident.

When you are at the chalice: do not make the Sign of the Cross and do not kiss the chalice. You should make the Sign of the Cross before stepping forward and only after you have walked away from the chalice.

Communion Cloth: Allow the two assistants to place the cloth directly under your chin. This is a "drop cloth" in case of any drips or spills. Do not hold the cloth under your chin or pull the cloth away—this is not helpful. There cannot be a gap between you and the cloth.

Form two lines up the middle and approach the chalice from whichever side you are sitting on. This applies to Sundays and weekdays. You do not need to "crisscross" in front of the tetrapod.

Infants: Those bringing up an infant should cradle the child in the **right** arm. Since infants receive a small drop of the Precious Blood, keeping the child in a reclining position can be helpful.

Being conscientious towards these practical matters will greatly assist me when distributing Holy Communion, and enhance our reverence for Our Lord present in the Holy Gifts.

Quick Orthodox Facts: Bread!

The bread we use for Holy Communion is known as PROSPHORA (*Greek: "offering"*). It is made from flour, water, yeast and, if desired, some salt. Before baking, it is stamped with a special seal, imprinting it with a cross and the letters IC XC NIKA—Greek for "Jesus Christ Conquers."

Before the public start of the Divine Liturgy, the priest prepares the bread and wine for Communion during a rite called PROSOKOMÍDIA. He cuts a cube—the part marked with IC XC NIKA—from the prosphora. This is then known as the LAMB, since this is consecrated and becomes the Body of Christ. We receive a portion of this in Holy Communion.

During Proskomidia, the priest also cuts small triangles of prosphora in honor of the Mother of God and nine categories of saints. He will also remember the living, and the departed by reading their names and removing small particles of bread. These are all arranged on the DÍSKOS (paten, Communion plate) and placed into the chalice, but are not distributed as Holy Communion.

The leftover portions of unconsecrated prosphora are cut up and distributed after Liturgy as ANTIDORON (Greek: "Instead of the Gift"). We should be careful about crumbs when receiving and eating this bread, as it is blessed.

On certain holydays, bread is blessed at Vespers along with wheat, wine and olive oil. This bread can either be prosphora or a more festive sweet bread. If you have ever noticed a different kind of bread being distributed on a holyday, it is usually because it was blessed at Vespers. This is also why we have MIROVÁNIE—anointing with blessed oil—on or near holydays. —Fr. David

Sacramental and Membership Information

Sick Calls can be made at any time. Please phone the rectory (724-346-4457) when a family member is admitted to the hospital, or to request a home visit to receive Confession and Communion. Hospitals do *not* call to alert the parish when someone is admitted.

Marriages are solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays. Circumstances may require a dispensation from the diocesan bishop. Consult the pastor at least six months in advance and before any plans have been made for the wedding reception. Marriages cannot be celebrated during the fasting seasons of the church, or on Fridays.

Baptisms are usually scheduled on Saturdays or Sundays, but other days are possible as well. Consult the pastor. Two godparents (godfather and godmother) are required, at least one of whom must be a practicing Orthodox Christian in good standing at an Orthodox parish, and the other (at least) a practicing, baptized Christian.

Church Funerals are, under ordinary circumstances, provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual and material obligations to the parish; otherwise, the funeral service is conducted at the funeral home. The Church does not permit cremation.

Parishioners in "good standing" are those Orthodox Christians who, as members of Saint John's Orthodox Church, strive to live according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church; participate in the life of the parish through regular church attendance, regular reception of Holy Communion and periodic Holy Confession (and receive these sacraments no less than once a year); if married, having been married in the Orthodox Church; and financially support the parish (especially through an annual "pledge").

Prospective members and returning members are asked to fill out an application form, copies of which are available in the church office.
