ANNUAL ELECTION OF OFFICERS MEETING NOTICE

Our Annual Election of Officers Meeting will take place on **Sunday, December 3, 2023** following Divine Liturgy. All members in good standing who are current on their spiritual and material commitments to the parish *(including the reception of Holy Communion and Holy Confession)* are asked to attend. If you are interested in serving on the 2024 Church Board, please speak with Jim Hynes.

In addition to the election of the 2024 board members, we will be voting on the following two **amendments to the church by-laws**: one to update the location of our church from Sharon to Hermitage, and the other to set parameters around the use of online bill payments. Please familiarize yourself with these by-laws revisions as listed below:

"ARTICLE 1, SECTION 1.- is stricken in part while the remainder of said paragraph shall remain in full force and effect and the following substitution made: The name of this corporation shall be Saint John Orthodox Church of Hermitage, Pennsylvania, and all references in the present-day By-Laws referring to Sharon, Pennsylvania are hereby deleted and reinstated as 3180 Morefield Road, Hermitage, Pennsylvania 16148.

ARTICLE V, SECTION 3 d.- is stricken in part while the remainder of said paragraph shall remain in full force and effect and the following substitute made:

"All bills shall be paid by checks, signed by the President, Financial Secretary, and Treasurer" is hereby amended to "The Church Board, on a case-by-case basis, can direct and authorize the Treasurer to make arrangements with utility companies or any other monthly financial obligations, to use the new banking process of Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT), which voids the necessity to sign physical checks to a utility or any other approved monthly bill each month."

In all other respects and aspects, BY-LAWS OF SAINT JOHN ORTHODOX CHURCH shall remain in full force and effect."

The Nativity Fast (Advent) begins on November 15th!

During these next six weeks, we prepare for the celebration of the Nativity of Christ. Here are some ways to observe this holy time:

♦ Fast

Fasting goes hand-in-hand with our spiritual preparation for the Nativity. Traditionally, every day from November 15th until December 25th was kept as a fast day. Without a doubt, this poses a challenge for most of us. So, what can we do, *practically* speaking?

The Nativity Fast should represent an *increase* of fasting in our life. Pastorally, Fr. David offers the following general idea: If fasting is not your strong suit during most of the year, then be *very* careful to abstain from meat on Wednesdays and Fridays during Advent. If you already keep those fasting days throughout the whole year, then add more days as you are able (Mondays, all week-days, all of the Nativity Fast, etc.). During the latter part of the Nativity Fast (December 12th onwards), try to increase your fast even more.

All of us are enjoined to observe the strict fast from meat and dairy on Christmas Eve, December 24.

Remember: it's not the *least* that we *have* to do, but the *most* that we *can* do for Our Lord!

• TAKE TIME TO PRAY DAILY

There are many ways to do this, but the key is to be consistent. You can use your prayer book, or pick up one of the "Basic Daily Prayers for Orthodox Christian" sheets in the vestibule (which has a short daily prayer rule). Be sure to offer the "Nativity Fast Prayer Challenge" from Metropolitan Gregory. Set this as a goal for the next six weeks. If you miss a day, just pick up again the next day.

• PRAY FOR YOUR CHRISTMAS CARD LIST

Each time you send a Christmas Card, ask God to bless the recipients. If you want to take it a step further, pray for them weekly or even daily.

• **Read the Scriptures**

There are limitless ways one can incorporate more

Scripture during this time. The "essential" passages from the Gospels to review before Christmas are chapters 1 and 2 of Matthew's Gospel and chapters 1 and 2 of Luke's Gospel.

• GO TO CONFESSION

As we sing in one carol: "Let every heart prepare Him room." During the Nativity Fast this year, Confessions will be heard before Sunday and Weekday Liturgies; before the Wednesday Evening Services; and by special appointment. Do not neglect this great sacrament of God's forgiveness!

♦ ATTEND DIVINE SERVICES

We have additional services scheduled throughout the next six weeks. On most Wednesday evenings at 6:00 PM, we will have a Prayer Service appropriate to the season. Additional weekday Divine Liturgies will be offered. Check the schedule for details.

• BE CHARITABLE

We think of charity as giving money to those in need—and that is certainly an act of charity! But charity comes from the Latin *caritas*, which denotes the kind of Christian love directed towards all people. As God showed His love for us by sending His Son, so we strive to show that same love in our actions and attitudes.

♦ THE "TRUE MEANING" OF CHRISTMAS?

Christmas is not primarily about "family", "togetherness", "generosity", or any such adjective. **Christmas is about Jesus Christ.** All of the wonderful aspects we associate with this holiday—the time with loved ones, the delicious foods, the gifts we exchange—flow from the fact that "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). This isn't just an intellectual fact. The Church gives us the Nativity Fast and the Christmas Feast every year as an opportunity to grow in our relationship with God and, thereby, with others. We should take advantage of it!

How can we "keep Christ in Christmas"?

By putting Christ at the center of our life now and always!

Glory to Jesus Christ!

Dear Beloved Faithful Clergy and Laity of our God-Protected Diocese,

It is hard to believe that this month marks the eleventh anniversary of my Consecration and Enthronement as your Hierarch. It has been a very strange couple of years with the arrival of the Coronavirus early in 2020. The pandemic turned our lives upside down in all aspects: physical, emotional, psychological, spiritual, social, and financial. Anxiety and despondency soared dramatically. Many of our Clergy and Laity were exposed and sickened. Unfortunately, we also lost many wonderful people of our Diocese and beyond. May their memories be eternal!

Today we see our world spinning out of control. Violence, poverty, hatred, drug overdoses, homelessness, theft and senseless killings are all increasing. We are at the brink of a World War with conflicts in Ukraine, the Holy Lands in the Middle East and other places around the planet raging. From the very beginning as God fearing people we have been praying for the Lord's help. In all of our Divine Liturgies additional petitions and prayers have been offered. And yet the struggle continues around the world. I believe we must intensify our prayers. If we are feeling like we are sinking because we are overwhelmed in our home life, work life, school life or even our social life (including social media and technology) we must be like Peter. He was walking on the water towards Jesus and when he became distracted by the winds and waves, he began to sink. Peter cried out, "Lord, save me!" (Matthew 14:30) and Jesus Christ reached down and pulled him out of the stormy sea. We too are sinking and need to cry out "Lord, save me!"

As we once again enter the Season of the Nativity Fast, I ask you, actually I plead with you, the good faithful people of our Diocese, to join me on a journey to meet the new

During these 40 days leading to the Nativity of our Lord let us increase our efforts in church attendance, in prayer, in fasting, in scriptural reading, in almsgiving, in repentance and confession, in receiving the Eucharist. This is who we should be as active Orthodox Christians.

In the last eight years, I have challenged everyone, Clergy and Laity, to offer a special prayer for peace during evening prayers. The text of this prayer will be provided by the Clergy for distribution. Each household should have sufficient copies so that each young person that can read has one by their bed to use nightly and those who are too young to read may say the prayer with their parents before they go to bed. Of course, all the adults should also participate.

To assist with this challenge, a special web page has been created on the Diocesan Website, which contains downloadable texts of the special prayer. Other postings will be made on various social media outlets to encourage maximum exposure and participation.

With all of us united in prayer this Nativity Fasting Season, I am convinced that we will help to improve our lives and those of others throughout the world.

Sacramental and Membership Information

Sick Calls can be made at any time. Please phone the rectory (724-346-4457) when a family member is admitted to the hospital, or to request a home visit. Hospitals do *not* call to alert the parish when someone is admitted.

Marriages are solemnized on Saturdays or Sundays. Circumstances may require a dispensation from the diocesan bishop. Consult the pastor at least six months in advance and before any plans have been made for the wedding reception. Marriages cannot be celebrated during the fasting seasons of the church, or on Fridays.

Baptisms are usually scheduled on Saturdays or Sundays. Consult the pastor. Two godparents (godfather and godmother) are required, at least one of whom must be a practicing Orthodox Christian in good standing at an Orthodox parish, and the other (at least) a practicing, baptized Christian.

Church Funerals are, under ordinary circumstances, provided for practicing Orthodox Christians who are current in their spiritual and material obligations to the parish; otherwise, the funeral service is conducted at the funeral home. <u>The Church does *not* permit cremation.</u>

Parishioners in "good standing" are those Orthodox Christians who, as members of Saint John's Orthodox Church, strive to live according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church; participate in the life of the parish through regular church attendance, regular reception of Holy Communion and periodic Holy Confession (and receive these sacraments no less than once a year); if married, having been married in the Orthodox Church; and financially support the parish (especially through an annual "pledge").

Prospective members and returning members are asked to fill out an application form, copies of which are available in the church office.
